### 2022 CALENDAR YEAR 1ST QUARTER REPORT

### The Challenges:

- Obtaining sufficient and trained staff to serve as qualified Municipal Court Clerks.
  - A part-time Municipal Court has been operating with minimum staffing for about a year (four (4) Court capable Clerk of Court positions).
  - Moving towards a full-time Municipal Court an addition of two (2) Court capable clerks would be warranted to support the need for expanding the weekly docket.
- Moving the Court to a full-time operation.
  - As a primary recommendation from the consultant team charged to review the current operations and structure of Albany's Municipal Court, a caseload review supports the need to provide a full-time Court (a conclusion supporting a position endorsed by the former 2016 City Commission).
  - To provide a full-time Court, additional resources to include staffing will be essential to support the expansion.
- Potential need to relocate Municipal Court.
  - To benefit from the potential expansion of the Court's full-time status, operating in a City managed facility would provide for more flexibility in docket scheduling, program interventions and services through Albany Works! (Community Court Program).
  - Additionally, there is speculation that an additional Superior Court Judge will be funded by the state and the Municipal Courtroom and associated courthouse space may be set aside for that expansion.

#### The Successes:

- As January 2022 started, Municipal Court found itself still operating under the COVID-19 judicial protocols. Even with reduced caseloads on the docket, the Court was able to work through a backlog of cases waiting to be heard by the Judge. Going from a six (6) month wait to approximately a three (3) month wait was no accident.
  - Strategies and enhancements in procedures either gained directly through the Municipal Court's engagement with a consultant charged to recommend best practices, or the Municipal Court staff themselves, using strategies shared by the selected vendor, ReEngine Consulting, LLC, adjusted the Court's processes and procedures to aid in the reduction of the caseload backlog.
- The Albany Works! (AW!) Initiative (Community Court umbrella) began operations on March 1, 2022. This initiative is building an infrastructure to offer alternative problemsolving justice options that link judicially-supervised offenders to drug treatment, alternative sanctions, and other services in order to reduce drug use, crime, incarceration, and recidivism. The implementation team is composed of member from the AW! design team, court staff, community stakeholders, and community service providers. An advisory panel of Subject Matter Experts (SME) are being utilized to support the creation of deliberate processes for a successful Community Court Initiative that includes significant community engagement. The Court has access to services provided by over 30 community service providers.

- Following 2019 when **DEVASTATING FACTORS** EMERGED DISRUPTING AN EFFECTIVE CITY JUDICIAL PROCESS, THE MAYOR AND COMMISSION DECIDED TO **ESTABLISH A COMMISSION** TASK FORCE TO REVIEW THE **CURRENT OPERATIONS OF THE COURT AND CONSIDER HOW** THE COURT, IF ANY, SHOULD LOOK IN THE FUTURE.
- THIS EXTENSIVE REVIEW BY THE TASK FORCE AND A SELECTED CONSULTANT BEGAN IMPLEMENTING BES PRACTICES AND HAVE PROVIDED A ROADMAP TO CONSIDER FOR TH OPERATIONS OF COURT IN THE FUTURE.


#### The Successes Continued:

- AW! established a partnership with Goodwill Industries of the Southern Rivers which supports the facilitation of program entry, community providers intake, and job placement access on site at their Career Center in Albany, Ga.
- AW! established a partnership between Albany Technical College and the Municipal Court to create and support the following options for AW! participants:
  - Direct enrollment for completion of GED
  - Direct enrollment for Technical skill tracks (including financial assistance)
  - Individualized assistance to support successful matriculation through the Technical College's programs (inclusive of Social Services, Finances, Wellness and Mental Health)
  - Support services targeting the successful matriculation of Black men through the college's programs (new Grant)
- AW! Is working to establish Evening/Night Court hours to better serve the community's needs. This additional Court docket may be physically conducted in the Mock Court Room, Criminal Justice Department on the campus of Albany Technical College. A pilot docket is being planned for September 2022.




### TASK FORCE KEY DATES & ACTIVITIES







- CY 22 FIRST QUARTER CITATION VOLUME IS UP BY 23% COMPARED TO CY 21.







- ALBANY'S POLICE DEPARTMENT IS THE PRIMARY LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY UTILIZING THE COURT.
