Our community outreach efforts are most noted in our Citizens Police Academy, Neighborhood Watch Programs and family friendly, informative community events held throughout the year. 2012 HIGHLIGHTS

In February, the city experienced its first homicide of the year on Crawford Drive. The victim, thirteen year old Darius Wallace was with friends when he was shot once in the abdominal area with a handgun. An eleven year old suspect was charged in the case.

Two months later on April 4th, a second homicide shock the community when 52-year old Anthony Westbrook

was found in a wooded area after being fatally wounded. Photos of a potential suspect caught on bank surveillance video wearing a mask, driving Westbrook's car and using his ATM card lead the evening news. Lead Robbery/Homicide Detectives would get a major break in the case when a Crime Stoppers Tipster called in information that helped identify the suspect as Sade Britt.

In August, Officers were dispatched to an East Albany mobile home park and found 44-year old Judith “Daisy” Hernandez deceased in her bedroom. Hernandez told her roommate that an unknown man tried to sexual assault her but she jumped out of the truck.

The fourth homicide of the year shed a huge light on Gang activity in Albany. On August 26th, 24-year old Dontavious Luke was fatally wounded after a shoot-out occurred in the Shackelford Shopping Center in East Albany. Through their investigation, the Robbery/Homicide Unit determined that Luke’s death was gang related and stemmed from a fight that occurred at the Sand-Trap night club in East Albany prior to the shooting at Shackelford.

Young faced suspect walked into the SunTrust Bank on Gillionville Road and handed a note, demanding money, to a teller. Bank surveillance photos were released immediately after the incident via the media, patrol car mobile data systems, Nixle, Twitter, and Facebook. The case is pending.

A local business owner put up a five thousand dollar reward after two suspects shot a motel patron who was visiting the city of Albany for thanksgiving. On November 27, 2012, Officers responded to the 1500 block of Dawson Road in reference to a shooting. The victim, Thomas Lee Bennett told police he was shot while making a trip to the motel’s ice machine. Bennett was approached by two black males who were attempting to rob him.

A Crime Stoppers tip helped Albany Police catch a robbery suspect, Joshua Jackson. Jackson was wanted for an armed robbery at the Subway store at 912 South Slappey on September 20. The tipster told authorities that Joshua Jackson was inside an apartment on Swift Street. APD went quickly to the scene, and Jackson was taken into custody without incident. Jackson also had outstanding warrants issued by Dougherty County Police.

PROPERTY CRIMES UNITS:

Burglary Unit detectives stayed busy throughout 2012 breaking up clusters of Entering Auto and Burglaries committed in all three districts by multiple suspects who were often repeat offenders. The case load lasted from January up until the end of the year.



OFFICER SHOOTINGS:

- Officer Willie Hall was struck by a bullet and taken to the hospital after responding to a Burglary call at 506 Haley Street on June 5, 2012. He fully recovered.
- Officer Christopher Arline responded to an active alarm call at a Pointe North Boulevard business and fired three shots at a burglary suspect who turned and pointed a gun at him. The suspect was arrested.

THE HEART OF THE COMMUNITY

In 2012, the Albany Police Department continued its dedication to maintaining a close relationship with our community. Lead by the Community Oriented Police Philosophy, Officers made contact with hundreds of citizens through crime prevention programs, events and speaking engagements. The partnerships created this year were instrumental in conveying Department goals and greatly improved the Department’s image.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS TORCH RUN:

This year, the number of runners representing the Albany Police Department in the Annual Special Olympics Torch



Run doubled from the previous year. APD officers laced up their tennis shoes and challenged their bodies during the nearly five mile run which started at the courthouse downtown and ended in the parking lot of Publix Supermarket in west Albany. The event is the largest fundraiser for Special Olympics Georgia and proceeds help send athletes to the summer games which are held in Atlanta.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS: COPS ON DOUGHNUT SHOPS:

Officers hit the corner of Pine Avenue and Slappey Boulevard to participate in the Special Olympics: Cops on Doughnut Shops annual fundraiser. Hours were spent collecting money in buckets from motorists who passed through the intersection over a three day period. All local law enforcement agencies participate in the event and this year over 15,000 dollars was raised by officers in Albany and Dougherty County.

CRIME STOPPERS GOLF TOURNAMENT:

The Albany Police Department supported the Albany Crime Stoppers biggest fundraiser by sponsoring a four man team to participate in the annual event. The proceeds from the event are used to reward tipsters who provide information that leads to an arrest. The non-profit organization is comprised of concerned citizens and local law enforcement representatives.

IN MEMORY OF CORPORAL TERRY LEWIS-FLEMMING

Police Officer Terry Lewis-Flemming was killed when her patrol car collided with another patrol car during a high speed pursuit. Officers were pursuing a truck occupied by two men who had just committed an armed robbery, when Officer Lewis-Flemming's patrol car collided with the other patrol car at the intersection of East Residence Avenue and Blaylock Avenue. Officer Lewis-Flemming's car then careened into a tree and burst into flames. The suspects continued to flee until their truck overturned a short distance away. Both men were arrested and charged with Felony murder as a result of Officer Lewis-Flemming's death. They were also charged with multiple felony counts in connection with the armed robbery





FALLEN BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

On October 28, 2011, Corporal Terry Lewis-Flemming was killed when her patrol car collided with another patrol car during a high speed pursuit of two armed robbery suspects.

After the incident occurred, the Department immediately came together as a family to express grief over the loss of Corporal Lewis-Flemming. Tears flowed heavily as the overwhelming shock of her loss began to settle in the hearts and minds of her fellow officers and friends.

IN MEMORY OF

In the days that followed, the department received tons of letters, phone calls, and emails from law enforcement agencies, citizens and strangers from all across the United States expressing their condolences. On November 4, 2011, many of those same people came to comfort us during her public memorial service which was held at the James H. Gray Civic Center. People lined the streets of Albany to honor and say their final farewell to Corporal Lewis-Flemming.

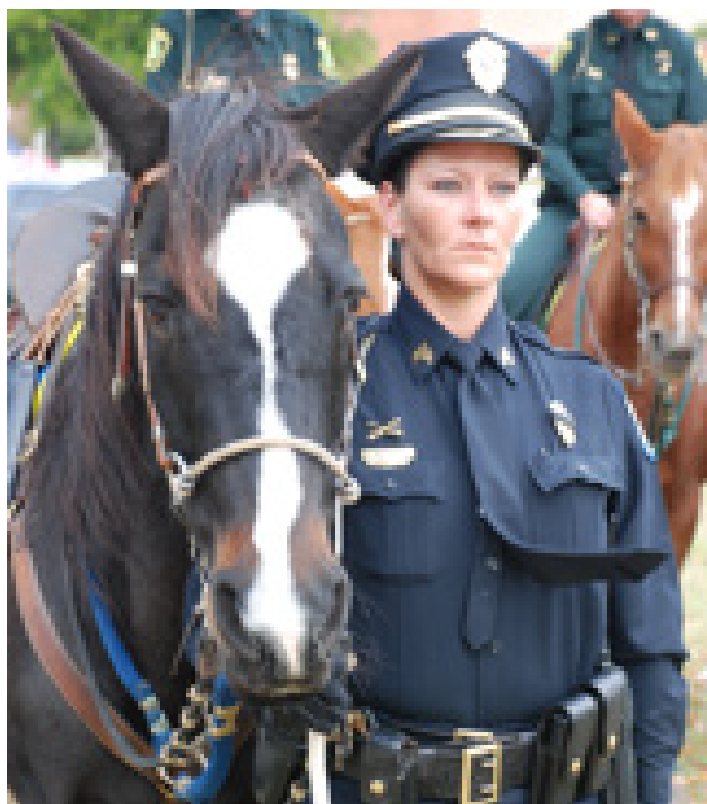
Her son, Shundrecus Lewis called his mother his hero. Co-workers remembered and boasted about her hard work and dedication to the Albany Police Department and Chief John Proctor described her as one of his finest officers who made a difference in the lives of the people in the our community.

Officer Lewis-Flemming served with the Albany Police Department for five years. She is survived by her husband and three children.

The tragic death of Corporal Terry Lewis-Flemming revealed an instant support and greater citizen appreciation of the sacrifice officers make on a daily basis to protect and serve.

Prior to her memorial service, Citizens joined the department and her family in honoring Corporal Lewis-Flemming during a candlelight vigil that was held on November 3, 2011 in the Veterans Park Amphitheatre. Friends, family, and co-workers reflected on her life and afterwards candles were lit in remembrance of her.

On April 14, 2012, the Blue Knights Motorcycle Club honored Corporal Lewis-Flemming during its 2012 Fallen Heroes Tour". After a brief ceremony, hosted by the Albany Police Department at Gethsemane Worship Center, her name was unveiled on the club's moving memorial which currently has the names of 678 men and women who have lost their lives serving their communities in the State of Georgia.

PERSONNEL & BENEFITS MANAGEMENT

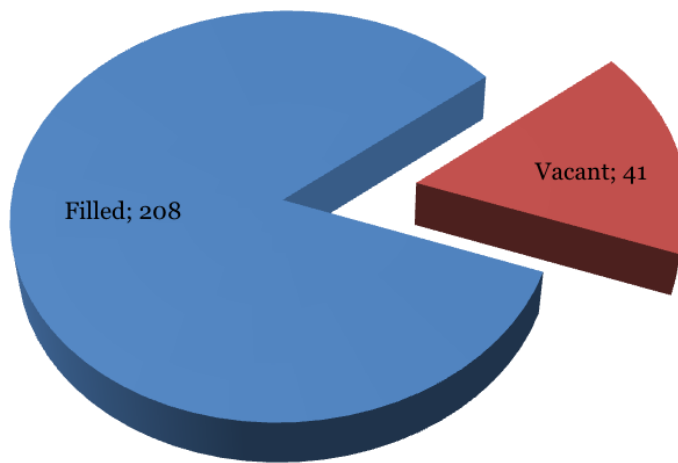

The Albany Police Department filled the position of Employee Resource Manager in 2011. The Employee Resource Manager provides Human Resources support to all department personnel. With oversight from the City Human Resources Department, this position will assist with; Personnel and Staffing Assessment, Benefits Management, FMLA, Workers Compensation and Employee Relations.

In May 2012 the process of creation and implementation of a Sworn Personnel Succession Planning Program was drafted. The proposed plan will address the needs of employee development and management development programs. The Succession Plan Program will affirm the agency's commitment to closing leadership competency gaps to improve organizational performance.

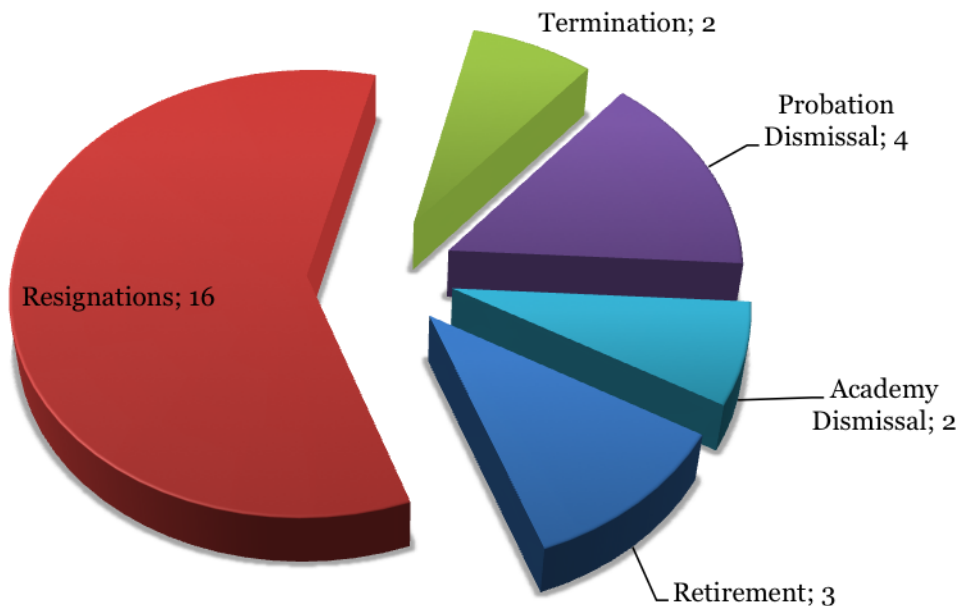
In 2012 APD was allocated 249 positions of which there were 41 vacancies remaining at year end. The Human Resource division will continue to work in conjunction with Recruitment and Retention in an effort to close the vacancy gap, decrease the attrition rate while also promoting the importance of employee retention.

BUDGET & EXPENDITURES

The City of Albany operates on a July 1st through June 30th fiscal year. The budget is compiled and adopted on an annual basis. Each year Department Heads are given a directive from the City Manager on expectations for the coming fiscal year's budget request. In FY12 the City Manager requested that all Departments begin compiling their budget requests by using a zero based budget approach. This entailed each department starting their budget at zero and building upward and eliminating any unnecessary spending. The Albany Police Department's (APD) budget request was presented as directed with increases requested to cover rising fuel & vehicle maintenance costs, along with additional funding to support modern training techniques for the entire department.

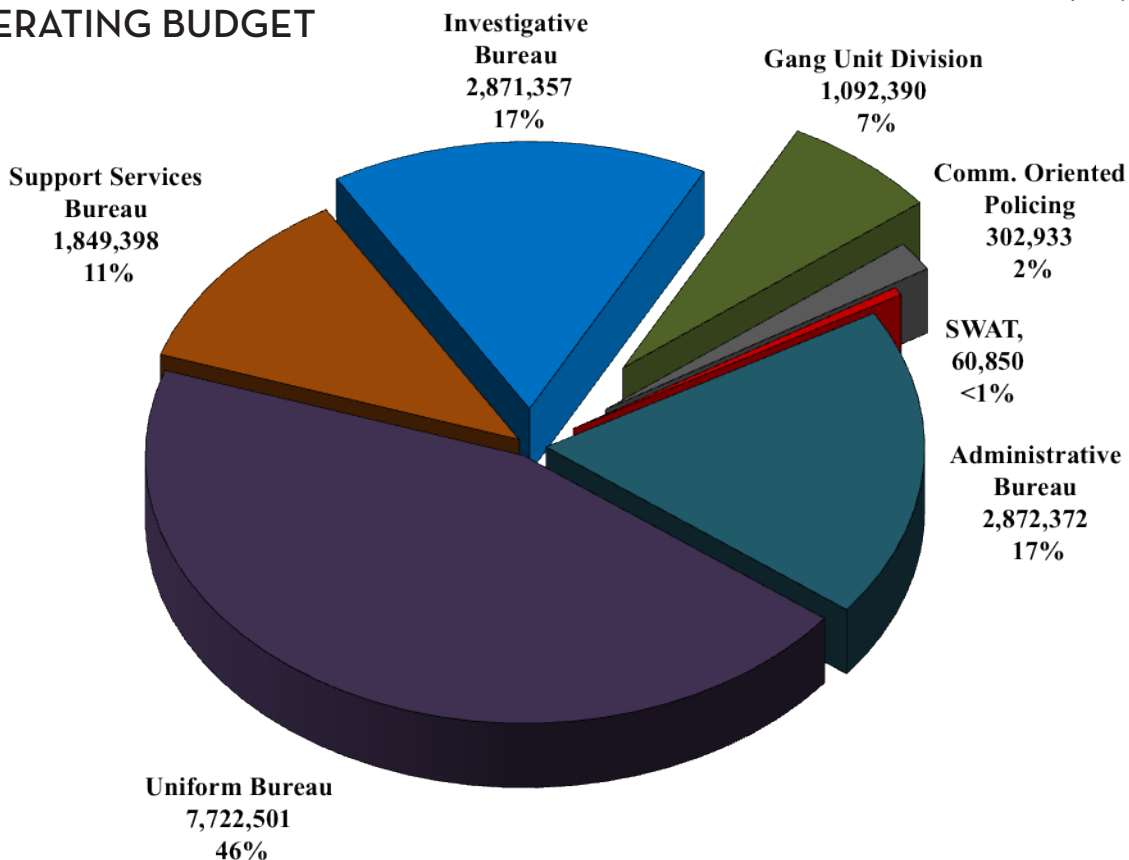
The FY2012 adopted budget totals \$16,402,643 and represents 29% of the City of Albany General Fund Budget. Capital expenditures (items greater than \$5,000) are requested and approved outside of the regular operating budget. The total budget approved for capital purchases totaled \$1,065,000 and only covered rolling stock (the replacement of aging fleet). All other capital requests were pushed forward to the next fiscal year due to budget constraints.

FUTURE EXPECTATIONS

After the adoption of the FY13 budget (July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2013), Department Heads were challenged to look for ways to cut personnel by 2% and operating cost by 10% going into next fiscal year. OPERATING BUDGET**

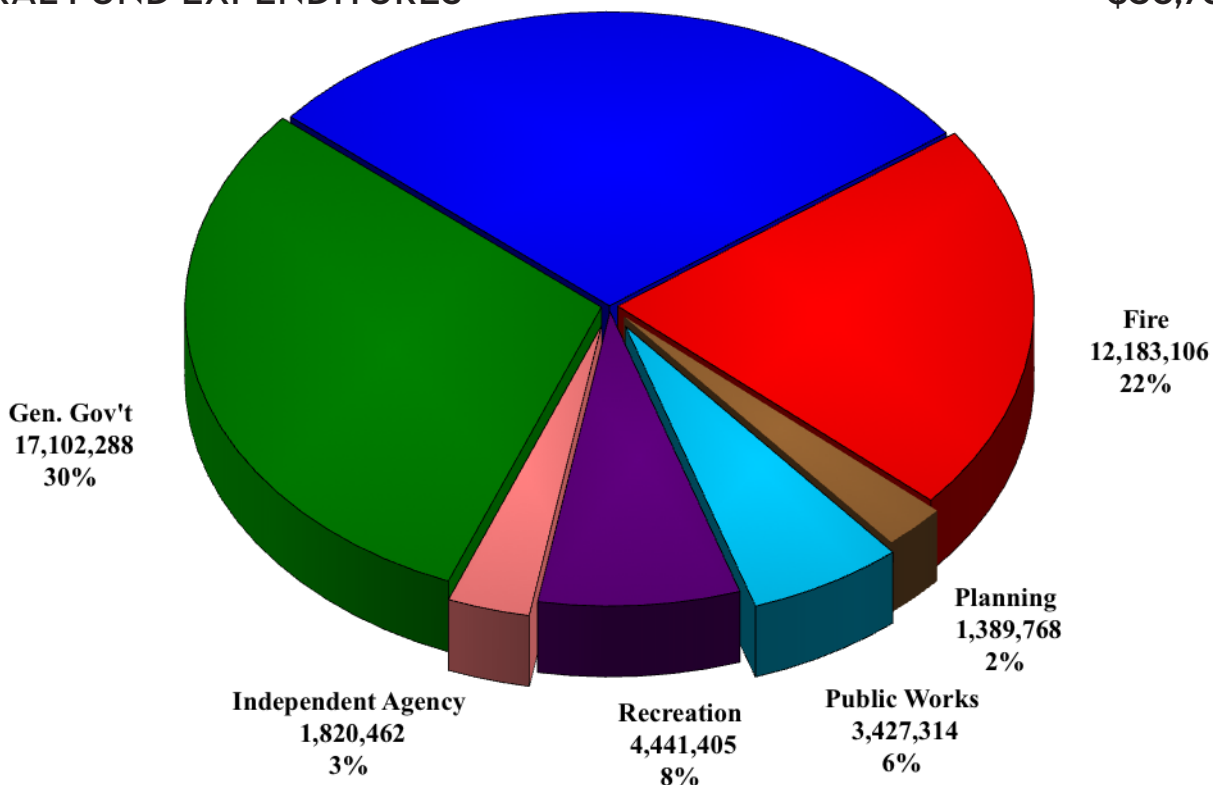
**TOTAL OPERATING BUDGET

MESSAGE FROM THE SECTION COMMANDER

2012 was a busy year for the units comprising the Office of Professional Standards Section of Albany Police Department's Administration Bureau. The Planning/Research, Grants and CALEA management unit applied for and received over half a million dollars in grant funding from several different sources. Working with assistance from the Crime Analysis Unit, this unit is also primarily responsible for ensuring the agency meets its goal of becoming Nationally Accredited by November of 2013.

The Crime Analysis Unit provided nearly 100 statistical crime reports to the APD Command Staff to develop crime prevention and crime suppression strategies. Informational reports were also generated for the City and County Commissioners, neighborhood watch groups, the Albany Housing Authority and individual concerned citizens. This unit is also heavily involved in the documentation required to obtain and maintain Georgia State Certification and National Accreditation.

The Internal Affairs Unit issued 127 "I/A Incident" numbers in 2012, down from 130 in 2011. These numbers are issued for external and internal complaints on agency personnel, every use of force (which includes any arrest requiring a suspect to be struck with hands, a less lethal weapon), every discharge of a firearm outside of training, every vehicular pursuit and every motor vehicle accident reviewed by the Accident Review Board.

Primary 2013 goals for the Office of Professional Standards include:

- Attain National Accreditation by November, 2013
- Create a database tracking system for the Internal Affairs Unit
- Upgrade our Crime Analysis abilities
- Ensure all personnel are thoroughly familiar with APD's SOPs.

INTERNAL AFFAIRS UNIT

The Internal Affairs Unit tracks all complaints against police personnel as well as all uses of force, vehicle pursuits and avoidable vehicular accidents. Most complaints are handled by the immediate supervisors of the personnel complained about. Internal Affairs only handles complaints specifically assigned to the unit by the Chief of Police. Those complaints are generally categorized as complaints that are particularly egregious such as criminal offenses (traffic offenses are not usually included here), ethics violations and incidents involving serious bodily injury or death to determine if any contributory violation of policy may have occurred. Additionally, any discharge of an officer's firearm is routinely reviewed by the Internal Affairs Unit.

Cases reviewed are given a finding which falls into one of the categories listed below:

Exonerated - means the allegation did occur, but was within policy.

Not Sustained - means the allegation can be neither proved nor disproved.

Sustained - means the allegation action was proved to have occurred and to have been a violation of policy or law or both.

Unfounded - means it was proved the allegation did not occur.

Policy Failure - means the relevant policy needs to be revised or added.

In 2012 the Internal Affairs Unit issued "I/A Numbers on a total of 127 cases, down slightly from 130 in 2011. Of these, 65 involved a use of force while making an arrest, up from 41 in 2011. Upon review, all of those in 2012 were found to have been within policy. There was only one vehicle pursuit reported during all of 2012, down from 2 in 2011. It was also found to be within policy. There were a total of 8 vehicular accidents which were found by the Accident Review Board to have been "avoidable."

Use of Force reports are broken down into "Hands" wherein only hands were used, "O/C Spray," "ASP Baton," "Taser" and "Firearm." Of the 65 Uses of Force reported, there were 16 incidents where the officers used physical force (hands only), to arrest suspects.

Two incidents resulted in injury to an officer and 8 suspects received minor injuries in 2012. This compares to 19 incidents of hands-only uses of force in 2011. In the 2011 incidents, 6 suspects received minor injuries along with 2 officers.

In 2012 there were 7 incidents wherein officers used O/C Spray on suspects, (compared to 3 in 2011). Two suspects received abrasions in those incidents in 2012 and there were no injuries to officers in either year.

There was one reported use of an ASP Baton on a suspect in 2012. This did not result in any serious injury to the officer or the suspect. There were no incidents in 2011 involving the use of an ASP Baton on a suspect.

2012 saw 35 Taser applications, compared to 5 in 2011, the first year the Taser was widely issued APD officers. None of these in either year resulted in injuries more serious than abrasions to either the officers or the suspects.

2012 saw 6 incidents involving an officer's discharge of a firearm, (most against aggressive dogs), none of which resulted in injury either to an officer or a suspect. There were only 4 firearm discharges in 2011, all against aggressive dogs. One of those instances involved an officer injury from a dog bite prior to use of the firearm.

Cases listed as "Citizen Concern" (external complaints), comprised 30 incidents, (compared to 45 in 2011). Of those, 2 were found to be "sustained," one of which resulted in termination of employment.

There were an additional 26 complaints generated internally (compared to 44 last year), 23 of which were found to be "sustained." Officers resigned in lieu of termination in two of those incidents. The remaining three internally generated complaints were found "unfounded" (2) and "not sustained," (1).

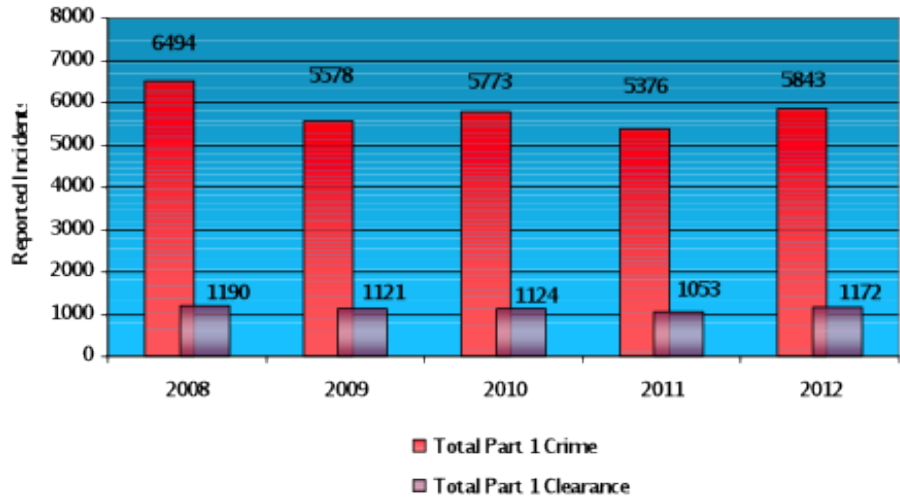

ANNUAL REVIEW OF REPORTED CRIME, CLEARANCES AND CALLS FOR SERVICE

The following information pertains to the City of Albany's Part I and II crime statistics. The Part I crimes are known as The Index offenses. These Index offenses are reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) annually via the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. The FBI's UCR Program is a nationwide, cooperative statistical effort of nearly 18,000 cities, universities and colleges, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement agencies voluntarily reporting data on crimes brought to their attention. Part II offenses are all crime classifications other than those defined as Part I.

Part 1 Crime & Clearance 5 Year Review

Part I Crimes are an indicator of reported criminal activity within a designated area. These crimes consist of two categories of crime: Violent and Property. Violent Crime is composed of the following offenses: Homicide, Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault. Property Crime is composed of the following offenses: Burglary, Larceny, Motor Vehicle Theft and Arson.



The annual review of the City of Albany's Part I Crime shows the overall Crime Trend for 2012 up by 8.69% as compared to 2011, and virtually unchanged as compared to 2010 with an increase of only 1.21%.

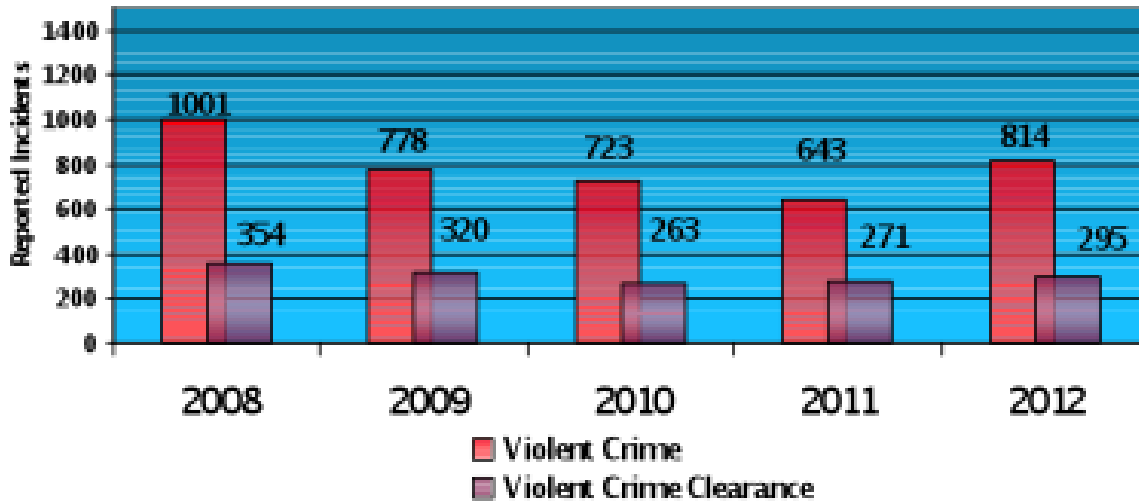

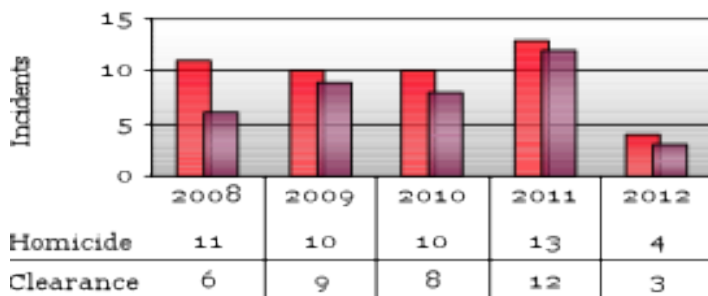
2012 Violent Crime experience the first increase in reported incidents since 2008. This was due to an increase of Robberies by 26% and Aggravated Assault by 34%. The overwhelming majority of Robbery and Aggravated Assault cases show that the victim and suspect were acquainted with each other. Significant items of note are that incidents of Homicide and Rape both were dramatically down with the lowest number of reported cases in over 25 years.

With an estimated population of 77,434 (US Census Bureau, 2010), and 814 reported violent crimes, this statistically equates to 11 Violent Crimes for every 1,000 citizens.

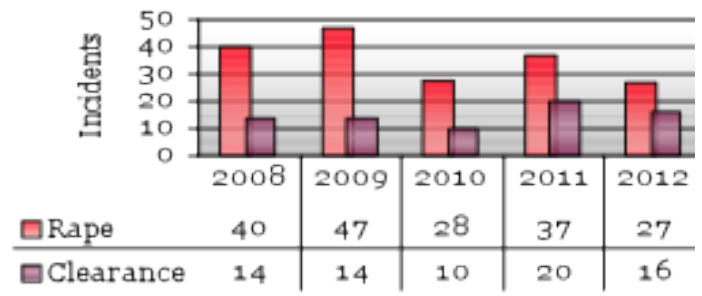
Violent Crime & Clearance 5 Year Review



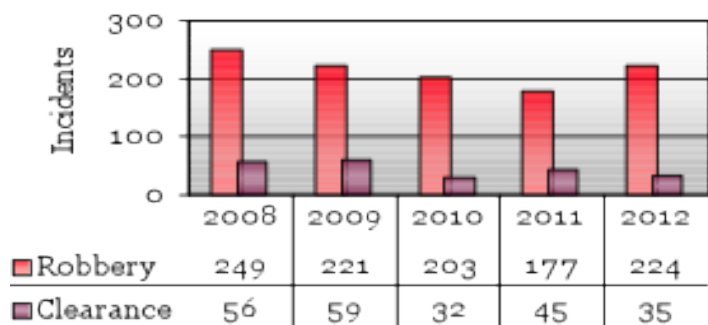

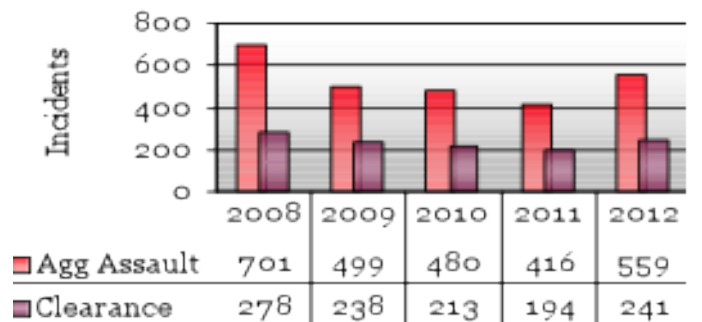

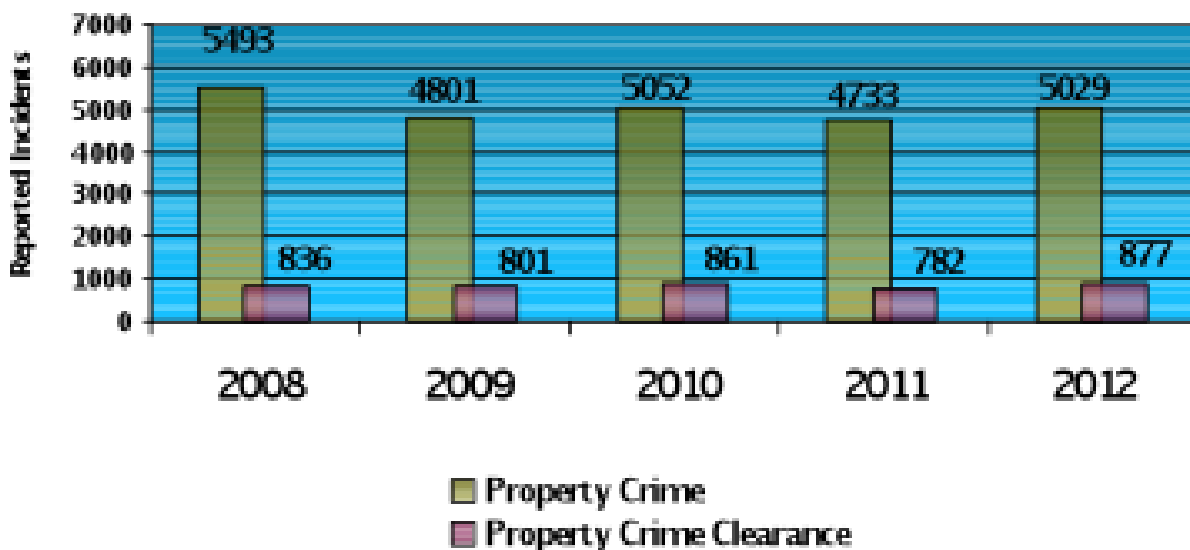

Property Crime in 2012 experienced a slight increase, as compared to 2011. Overall Property Crime in 2012 was 6% higher than in 2011 with the driving factors being larceny. There were 209 more incidents of larceny in 2012 than in 2011. This increase is directly attributed to an increase in Entering Auto incidents.

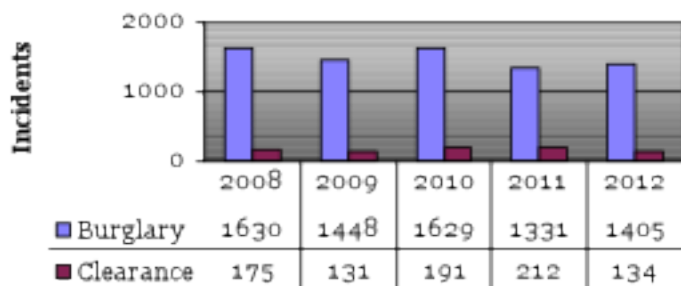
Again, with an estimated population of 77,434 (US Census Bureau, 2010), Overall Property Crime statistically equates to 65 incidents for every 1,000 citizens.

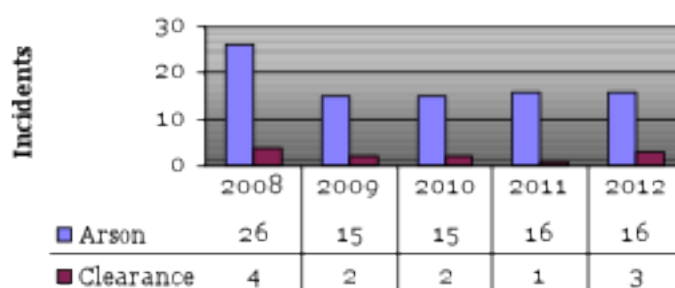

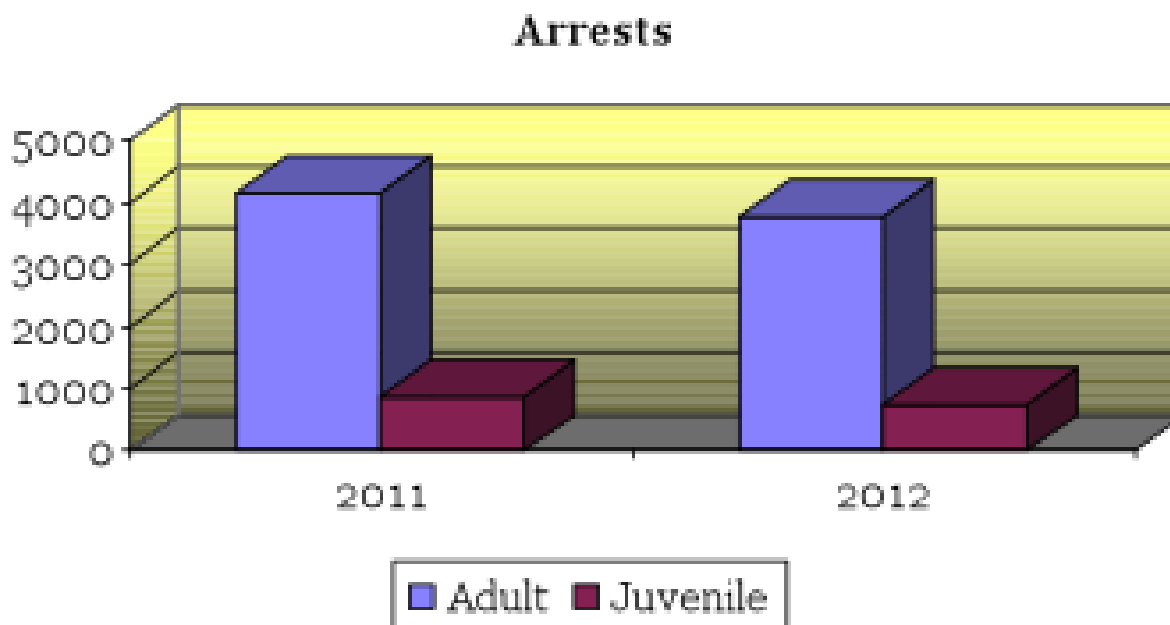

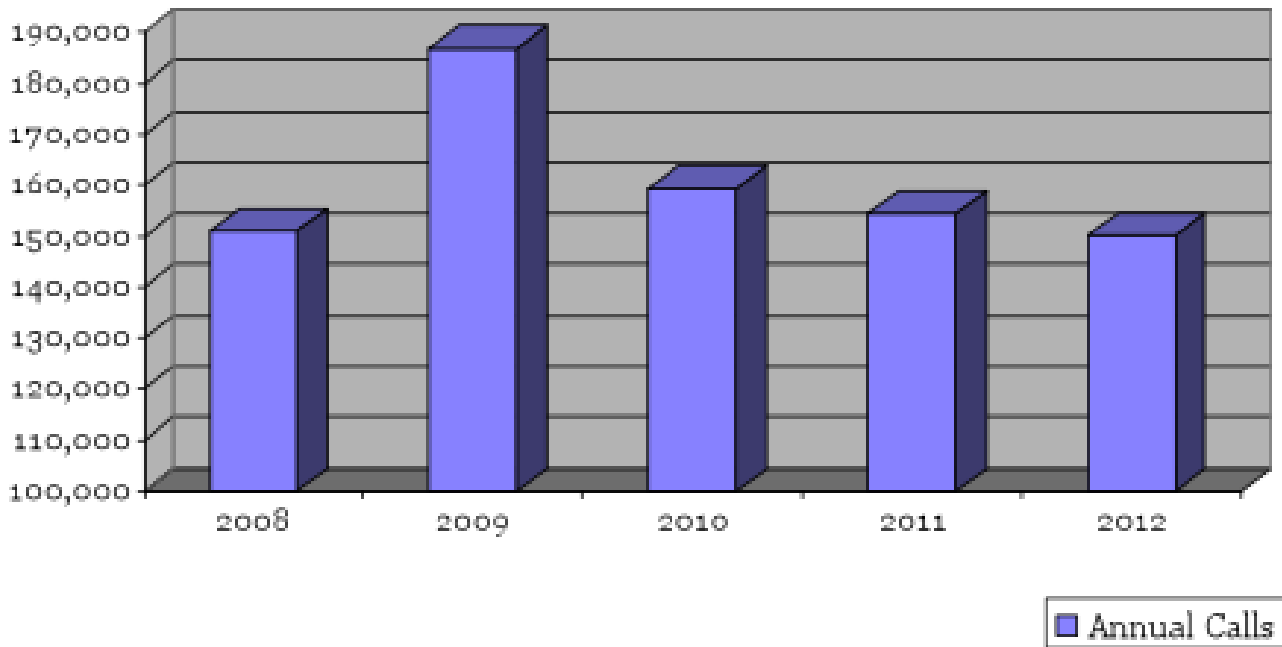

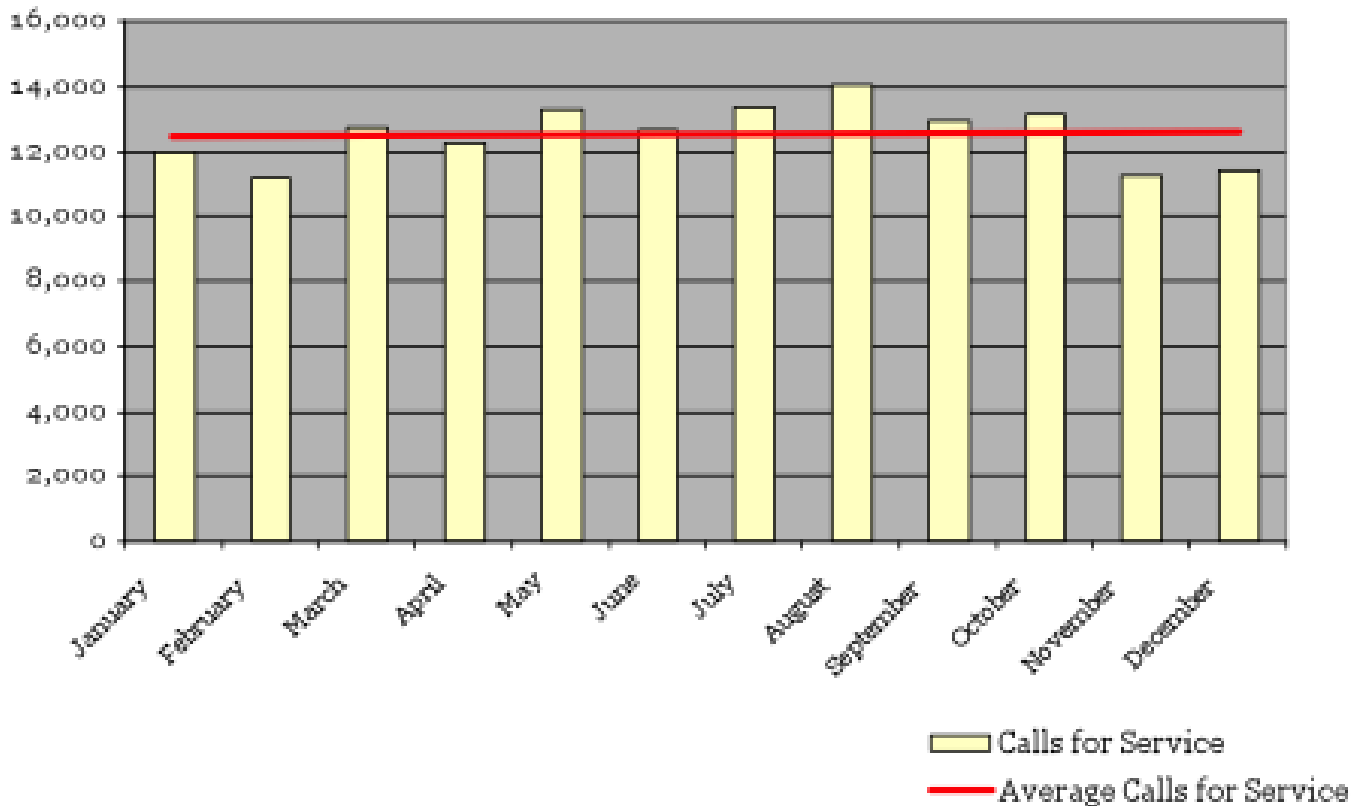

Annual Calls for Service

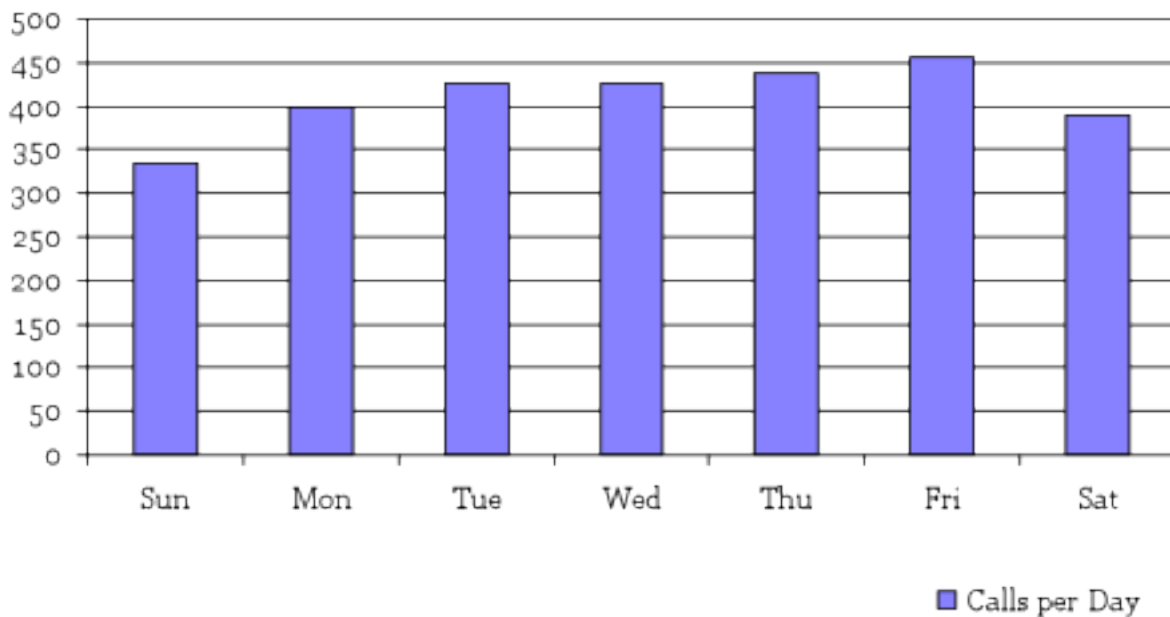


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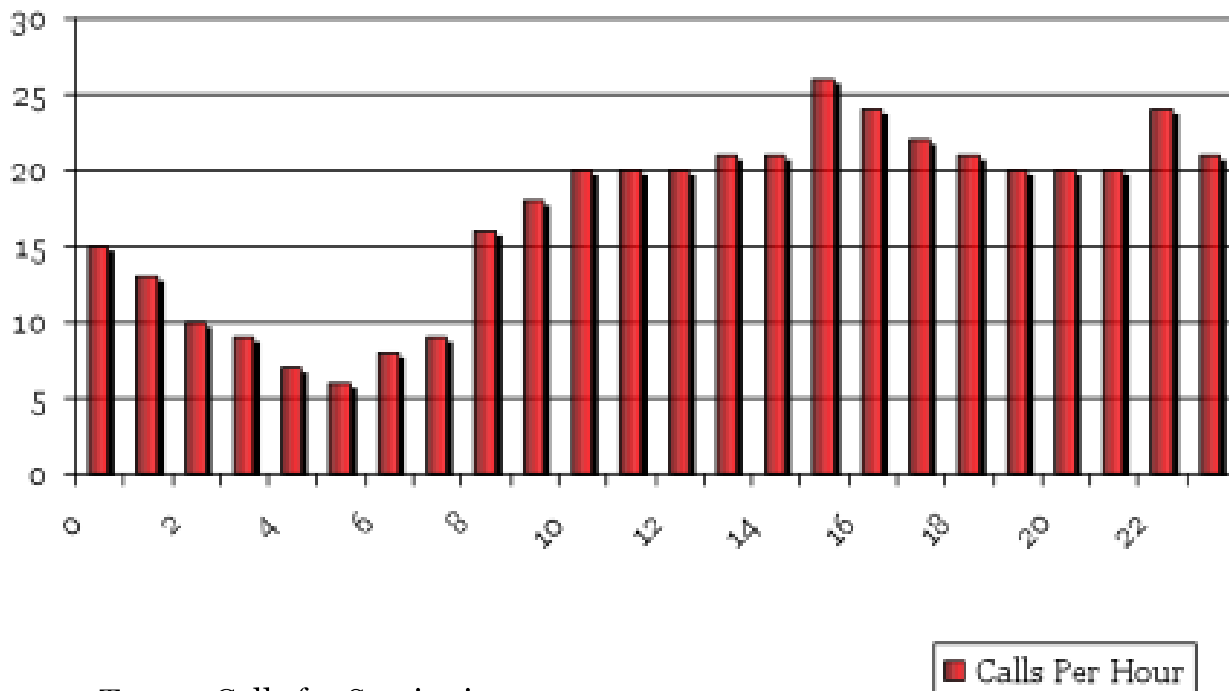
2012 Calls for Service by Month

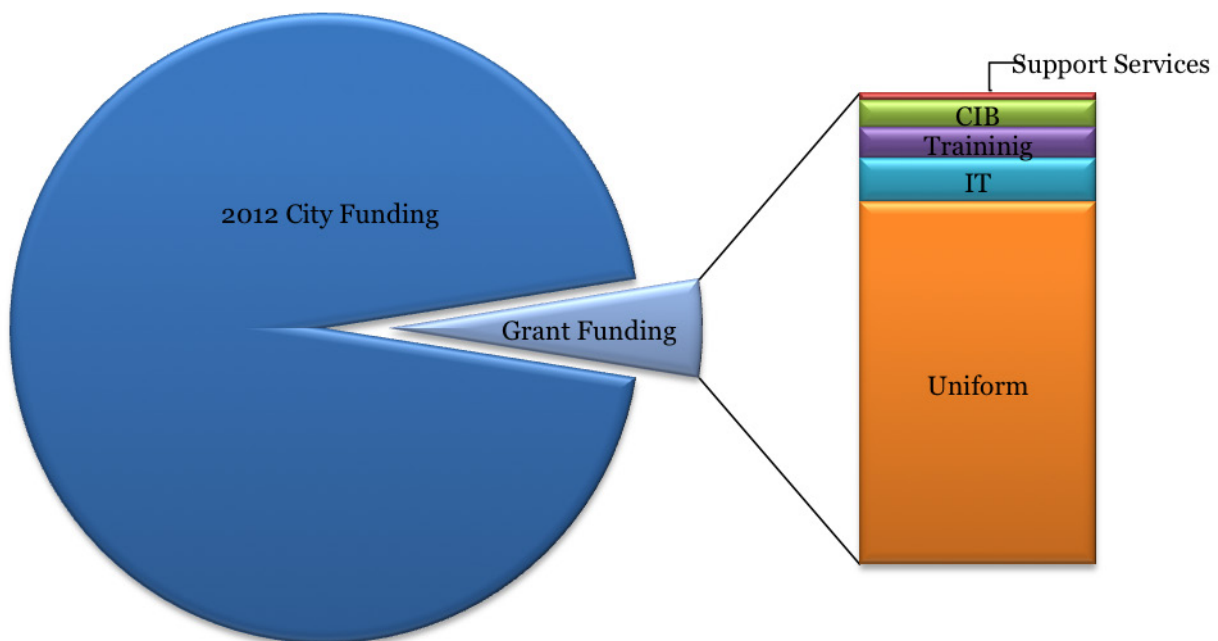
The Planning/Research, Grants and Certification management unit oversees \$858,937.60 in grant funding; of this amount \$175,144.00 of funding was successfully obtained during the 2012 grant period. Grant projects and programming include; Explosive Ordinance Disposal Unit, Project Lifesaver, Canine Unit, Bullet Proof Vests, Georgia Terrorism Intelligence and Community Oriented Policing. Successful project implementation includes but is not limited to the following purchases and technology upgrades; Fingerprint ID, Explosive Ordinance Disposal Unit Robot, Training & Development, ETicket Units, Radar Trailers, Tasers and Polygraph equipment.

Having managed and achieved Georgia State Re-Certification in September of 2011, Planning & Research has maintained the documentation required to re-certify again in two years, in addition the department's efforts to attain National Accreditation through the Commission for Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, (CALEA) has become our next goal. Our official "kick-off" for that effort began in March of 2012.

Though normally a three year process, we are moving aggressively toward achieving National Accreditation in November of 2013 Winston Salem North Carolina, less than 24 months!

As we approach 2013 as a department we will be faced with a significant decrease in alternative funding resources, programming and access to affordable training and education. These pitfalls have become a common place in all law enforcement agencies coupled with the expectation of maintaining public service mandates at and/or above its current level. Planning & Research will continue its quest to maintain department grant and certification compliance while addressing the needs, goals/objectives and outcomes of the department through national legislative mandates, strategic planning and policing concepts research and review.

UNIFORM BUREAU

The Uniform Bureau of the Albany Police Department is the largest and most visible division of the department. Uniformed patrol officers are tasked with providing front line service and answer the majority of all calls for service received by the agency. The City of Albany is divided into three patrol districts. Uniform Patrol officers work 10 hour overlapping shifts to provide 24 hour, seven day week coverage to each of the 15 patrol beats divided between the 3 districts.

The primary responsibility of uniformed patrol officers is to provide direct law enforcement services by answering and generating calls for service. A call for service can be anything from a citizen complaint of a barking dog to violent crime in progress. Calls for ser-

vice are also generated by individual officers as they conduct traffic stops, address violations of law which they observe, or conduct community activities such as Neighborhood Watch meetings. The Albany Police Department handled over 148,000 calls for service in 2012. This averages out to over 800 calls for service annually for each sworn officer employed by the department, including supervisors and administrators.

In addition to the three Patrol Districts, the Uniform Bureau also includes the Gang Task Force, Special Operations, and personnel assignments to the Albany/Dougherty SWAT Team and the Albany/Dougherty Drug Unit. This annual report contains a summary of activity for 2012 from each of the District and Unit Commanders.



GANG UNIT

Captain Wendy Luster

It is an honor and a privilege to serve as Commander of the Gang Task Force. It has been a remarkable and rewarding journey to share my career with such a team of dedicated officers as those on our force. The Gang Task Force consists of three supervisors and nine officers who work tirelessly to eliminate gang activity in the City of Albany. Although our team consists of a few members we are very proactive in areas, positively affecting community of life issues. Our goal is targeting gangs to make our neighborhoods safe in those areas where gangs have been identified. Our investigators are divided into three teams, which are very proactive in reducing and eliminating gangs: the **Investigative Team**, the **Intelligence Team**, and the **Suppression Team**. Our officers have received gang training in several different areas, which provides them with a current update on gangs, their identifiers, and initiation rituals. Training also assists in providing a solution to help bring positive dialogue into our community in relation to street gangs and gives us a different approach to reducing youth gang violence. With the deployment of personnel who are committed towards solving our gang problems, we have witnessed a reduction in gang activity for 2012. With the support of the community we were able to reduce gang activity and strengthen quality of life for all citizens. The Gang Task Force is very appreciative of those who have taken the initiative to support the police department in our crime fighting efforts. In an effort to prevent gangs in our community we will continue to educate, inform, and recognize potential threats involving gang activity. We will continue to work on new programs, assisting in providing alternatives for dealing with our gang problems. Our efforts

are ongoing in identifying, arresting, and prosecuting gang members. We are also committed to the removal of gang graffiti from our community and have been successful in forming partnerships with other law enforcement agencies. We will continue our efforts in utilizing all segments of the community such as; parents, clergy, the judicial system, and social services. We will continue to address our gang problem through proactive policing, gathering intelligence, and investigating cases until resolution. The public can continue to assist by attending community meetings, discussing gangs with their children, encouraging the removal of graffiti, and providing information to the Albany Police Department Gang Task Force regarding gang activity.

We know we face many challenges as young people continue to join gangs; however, we should be encouraged and continually vigilant toward our goal. We welcome the support of our community and would like to thank those who have made a difference in the job we do daily.

On behalf of the Gang Unit, I sincerely thank all stakeholders of Albany/Dougherty County for their continued support and dedication. We especially thank our Mayor, Dorothy Hubbard, all City Commissioners, City Manager James Taylor and Chief John Proctor for their continued support and allowing us to serve.

BRIEF HISTORY

The Albany Police Department Gang Unit was formed in December 2008 with the support of our Mayor, City Commissioners and City Manager, after a study concluded that our City was experiencing the same gang activity that the Nation as a whole is experiencing. The unit was approved for 12 members and in 2009 was amended to 14. The purpose of the unit is to perform highly responsible tactical and professional work directed towards the suppression of criminal gang activities in the City of Albany, investigating gang related crimes, identifying and documenting gang members, educating the public on gang activity, assessing the nature and scope of illegal gang activities, while penetrating and dismantling the criminal activities. With a proactive investigative effort, the Gang Unit will also target specific criminal enterprises to eliminate gang power and influence, identify opportunities for coordinated inter-county and inter-departmental planning to implement prevention strategies, and to identify and review major research studies, national surveys and community models for addressing problems.



Albany Police Department Gang Unit

The unit now consisting of twelve officers is now under the leadership of Deputy Chief Mark Scott (Uniform Bureau Commander) and Captain Wendy Luster (Gang Task Force Commander). Captain Luster is joined by Lt. Michael Persley and Sgt. Ernest Thompson (Field Operations) in supervising and managing the unit. Since 2009 the Gang Unit has made approximately 1,726 arrests. Approximately 650 of those arrests were gang related in nature. We have identified four major gangs in the City of Albany; however, other gangs have spawned from those gangs. Approximately 70 % of the gangs identified are homegrown gangs.



We have initiated several operations to assist in our efforts to eliminate gang activity in our community. The Albany Police Department's Gang Task Force continues to do the work it started in 2009. Our goal is to continue eliminating gang activity in the City of Albany by taking proactive measures in prevention, intervention, and suppression, and continuing to enforce city ordinances and state laws throughout the city.



SPECIAL OPERATIONS

The Albany Police Department has participated in several operations over the years; however, the most recent operations in 2012 are as follows: Operation Summer Fest, Operation Head Bussa, Operation 734 (Tornadoe), Operation Club Check, The 2012 Socks Operation, Operation Blue Invasion, and Operation Field Interactions with Albany Probations, Operation Club Check (Code Enforcement), Operation "Run But You Can't Hide", Operation Officer Presence, Operation Plain Clothes, Operation Zero Tolerance, and Operation Skulls and Snakes. Some of these operations were designed to monitor the activity of gang members and eliminate their efforts to commit crimes. Many of these operations resulted in the arrest of wanted persons and allowed us to remove weapons from our city streets. Other arrests made during these operations resulted in the following charges: suspended license, open containers, seatbelt violations, possession of co-

caine, possession of marijuana, saggy pants violation, giving false information, disorderly conduct, and probation/parole violation.

The Gang Unit has also assisted other agencies in capturing suspects, which were wanted in other states. In May 2012 we were successful in assisting ICE (U.S. Immigration and Custom Enforcement) in the deportation of an illegal alien who was wanted for trafficking of firearms and marijuana. We have also assisted the U.S. Marshalls in apprehending a wanted person out of the state of New York. In addition we were invited to participate in a tactical training event with the Department of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (March 2012). Our relationship continues to grow with outside agencies.



YOUTH VIOLENCE PREVENTION ACTIVITIES

The number of young people joining gangs in Albany, Georgia is increasing. Many of these young people joining gangs are at risk youth struggling with family problems, low self esteem, and peer pressure. Gang membership increases the likelihood that members will commit serious and violent crimes. This poses a significant challenge to our schools, law enforcement, and human services agencies. Our goal is to continue disrupting the level of gang involvement by utilizing strategies for intervention. The Gang Task Force has visited

elementary, middle, and high schools in the Dougherty County School System to include daycares, educating the youth about gangs and healthy options. We have visited churches and neighborhood watch meetings to speak with parents and members of the community about gangs disseminating prevention information. The following community events and

SUPERVISION OF THE UNIT

The **Gang Unit** consists of a Captain, Sergeant, and a Lieutenant. The Captain works under the guidance and direction of the Deputy Chief of Police (Uniform Bureau) and directly supervises the lieutenant and other assigned Investigators. All three play an important role in supervising and managing the Gang Unit. They handle complaints and concerns addressed by citizens and manage the subordinates under their control. The supervisors work as a team in planning, developing, and directing the activities and tactical operations of the Gang Unit in accordance with established Standard Operating Procedures of the Albany Police Department. They also work with citizens by attending Neighborhood Watch Meetings and providing Gang Awareness to the community. They work well with internal and external customers. They ensure that personnel provide proficient and prompt law enforcement services and establish and communicate general and specific department rules, regulations, policies and procedures. They ensure that laws and ordinances are enforced.

- Track criminal activities that affect our communities, with the primary concentration in gang activity.
- Reduce overall gang activity and membership through the implementation of community awareness programs involving neighborhood associations, faith based associations, community service providers and other law enforcement entities.
- Visit at least ten religious institutions and provide them with information regarding prevention, intervention and suppression strategies through collaborative efforts.
- Incorporate the rapid exchange and dissemination of vital information to ensure the safety of citizens and employees within the City of Albany/Dougherty County.
- Acquire enhanced technology and training in order to enhance our knowledge and better serve the citizens of Albany/Dougherty County.
- Continue to be proactive in our eradicating efforts; develop RICO (Federal and State) cases and assist in the prosecution of individuals that violate said.
- Continue to build trust, mutual respect and work with other law enforcement agencies, ministers, neighborhood watch groups, schools, housing developments, and civic organizations in order to eradicate gangs and violence.
- Continue to remove weapons and drugs from our streets.
- Enhance our data base regarding identifying criminal street gangs, their members and activities.
- Continued execution of warrants and increased surveillance surveillance

SUPPRESSION TEAM:

The theory behind gang suppression is to overwhelm the aggressive behavior of the targeted gang and/or gang member. The Suppression Team is highly visible in those areas where gang activity has been identified over the years. The job of the Suppression Team is to identify, monitor, and apprehend gang members and eliminate their activity. They not only focus on gang members but quality of life issues, which results in our neighborhoods being much safer. They are highly visible and very proactive in enforcing city and state laws. The Suppression Team also disseminates intelligence to other law enforcement agencies.

INVESTIGATIVE TEAM:

The Investigative Team investigates all gang crimes committed by gang members in the City of Albany. They maintain a working relationship with the Criminal Investigative Bureau and other agencies as well. The Investigative Team works with all gang investigators in solving gang cases. They also work very closely with the District Attorney's Office in providing court testimony. Their role is to also assist with training and gang awareness presentations.

INTELLIGENCE TEAM:

Gang Intelligence is the primary focus of the unit. It is the job of all investigators to gather intelligence for the purpose of identifying gang members who are involved in crimes. Intelligence gathering is obtained by conducting plain clothes surveillance and debriefing informants, victims, suspects, and gang members. The Intelligence Team is responsible for the intelligence gathering of gang members and their organizations. They gather information to share with other surrounding agencies and collect information from other agencies to be share with the Gang Unit and other Divisions of the Albany Police Department. This team identifies street gang members who engage in criminal activity. They are able to provide information on new gangs as well as those gangs that are active or inactive. Because of the information they provide we are able to identify problems that may arise because of gang activity, such as burglaries, home invasions, rape, robbery, entering autos, fights, thefts, and other crimes.

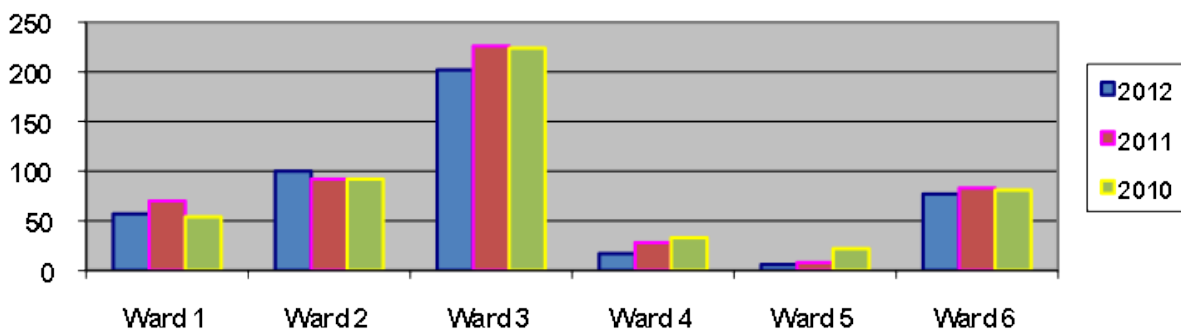

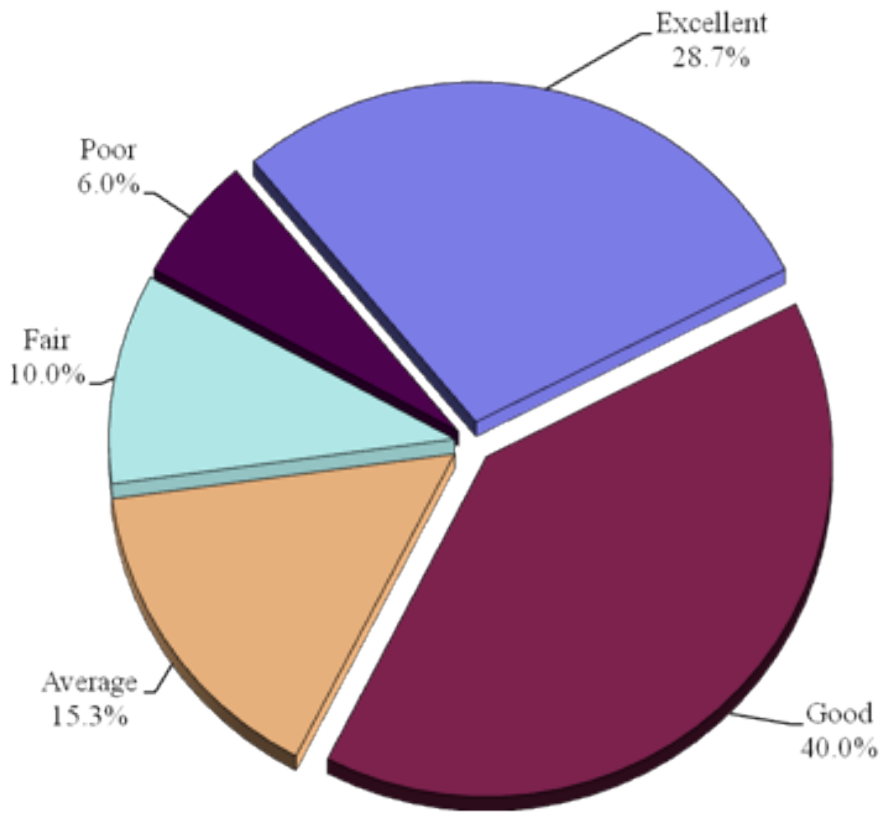

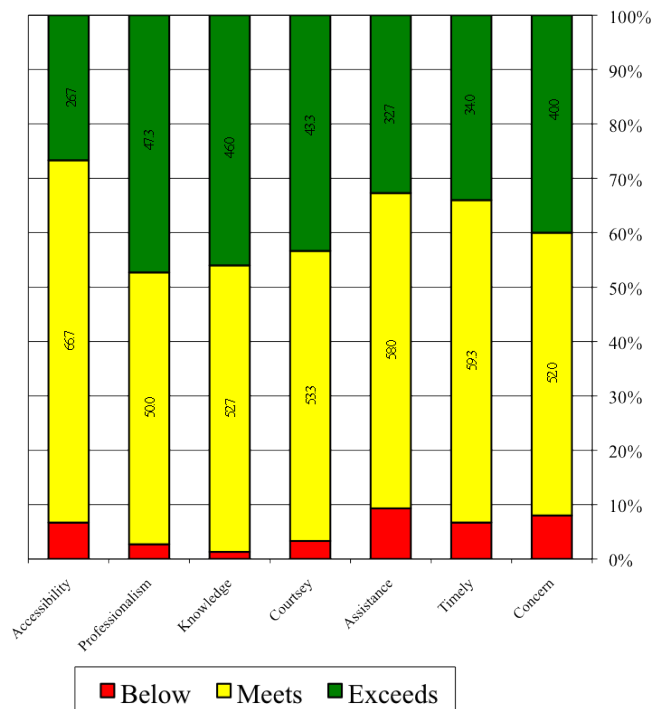

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

Captain Reginald Brown

BRIEF HISTORY

During my tenure as Captain of the Special Operations Division I have focused on building collaborative partnerships with internal and external law enforcement agencies, while also maintaining proactive and current policing concepts to combat offenses such as DUI and other nuisance traffic offenses. The Albany Police Department Special Operations Division is composed of a Traffic Section, Downtown Patrol, Animal Control and the AmeriCorps.

SPECIALIZED UNITS

The traffic unit is presently staffed with one supervisor and four officers. This section is responsible for working accidents and conducting and selecting traffic enforcement initiatives to lower the crash rate. In July of this year, the department purchased four license plate readers to assist with removing uninsured motorists, expired registrations and stolen vehicles off the street. This year, the traffic division worked a total of 987 crashes on the streets, made 1,078 crash cases, of the aforementioned total 604 crashes were on private property and 530 of those involved injuries. Four fatalities have occurred this year stemming from excessive speeding and driving under the influence of alcohol. The Special Operations Unit has made 128 arrests - 17 of those being DUI arrests in 2012. We also conducted 509 funeral escorts and issued out 3,106 citations and 4,587 warnings.





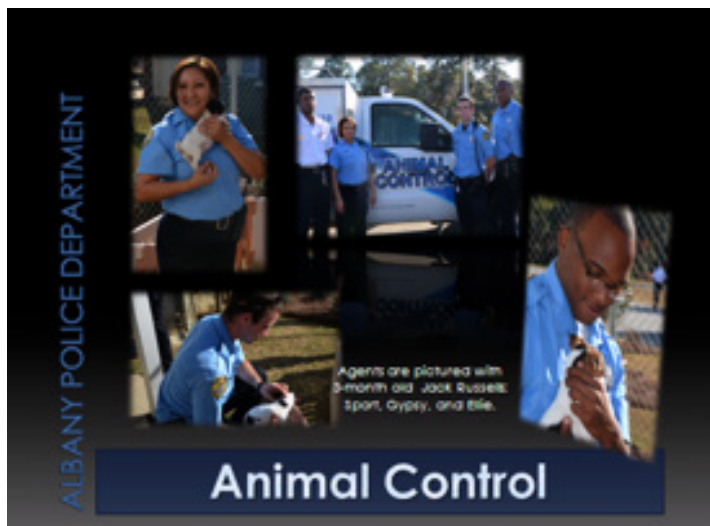
DOWNTOWN PARKING ENFORCEMENT

Consists of two retired civilians, who mark tires for parking violations downtown Albany. They work in a Gem modified vehicle with the APD vehicle markings. This unit has written a total of 1,660 citations for 2012. They do an excellent job of marking the tires and making sure the general public follows the parking regulations for downtown Albany. In addition to the parking patrol officers, there are two uniformed foot patrol officers who patrol this area using patrol cars, four-wheelers and the motorized T3 units. Those officers make sure that all of the laws are enforced downtown, as well as in the Riverfront Park.

ANIMAL CONTROL SECTION

The Animal Control section is presently staffed with a Superintendent and 3 agents. Animal Control Agents, Ryan Cauley and Nicholas Streeter were hired and completed the new hire training and the Field Officer Training and passed the board to become Animal Control Agents. These agents will be enrolling in a course in 2013 to become certified through national standards. They enforce all the City of Albany animal ordinances. Animal Control for fiscal year 2012 issued 460 citations and 1,369 violation warnings. We responded to

8,214 service calls this year. Animal Control impounded a total of 2,438 animals-1,619 dogs and 819 cats. We responded to 89 after hours Emergency Calls in which 133 animals were taken to the veterinarian located at 140 North Magnolia for treatment or euthanized. Animal Control also captured 50 none domesticated animals in the city. In closing, the Animal Control plan of action for 2013 is to continue to provide courteous and professional service to the public. Also, continuing our educational pursuit of keeping the citizens of Albany informed regarding the Ordinances concerning animals. Animal Control will continue to develop the expertise needed to maintain the highest standards of professional excellence to effectively, enforce the laws, policies and regulations of the department.



2011-2012 AMERICORPS CADET PROGRAM

The Albany Police Department AmeriCorps Program consisted of ten (10) college students. They worked alongside the police department doing community service events to help provide and improve visibility of the police department in high crime areas. AmeriCorps Cadets completed 30 community service projects that helped educate residents on crime prevention, community clean-ups, and youth focused projects. Approximately 15 litter pick-ups were completed to help with visibility of the police department in high crime areas. Seventeen (17) monthly crime prevention projects were a focus of the AmeriCorps cadets to increase citizen contact within troubled areas. Over 200 citizen contacts were made in reference to burglary, theft, and fraud preventions. The Cadets performed activities in an attempt to provide outreach to senior citizens. On-going outreach activities, such as Wellness visits and calls, Crime Prevention Projects, and Community Strengthening services provided for seniors in the following high crime areas:

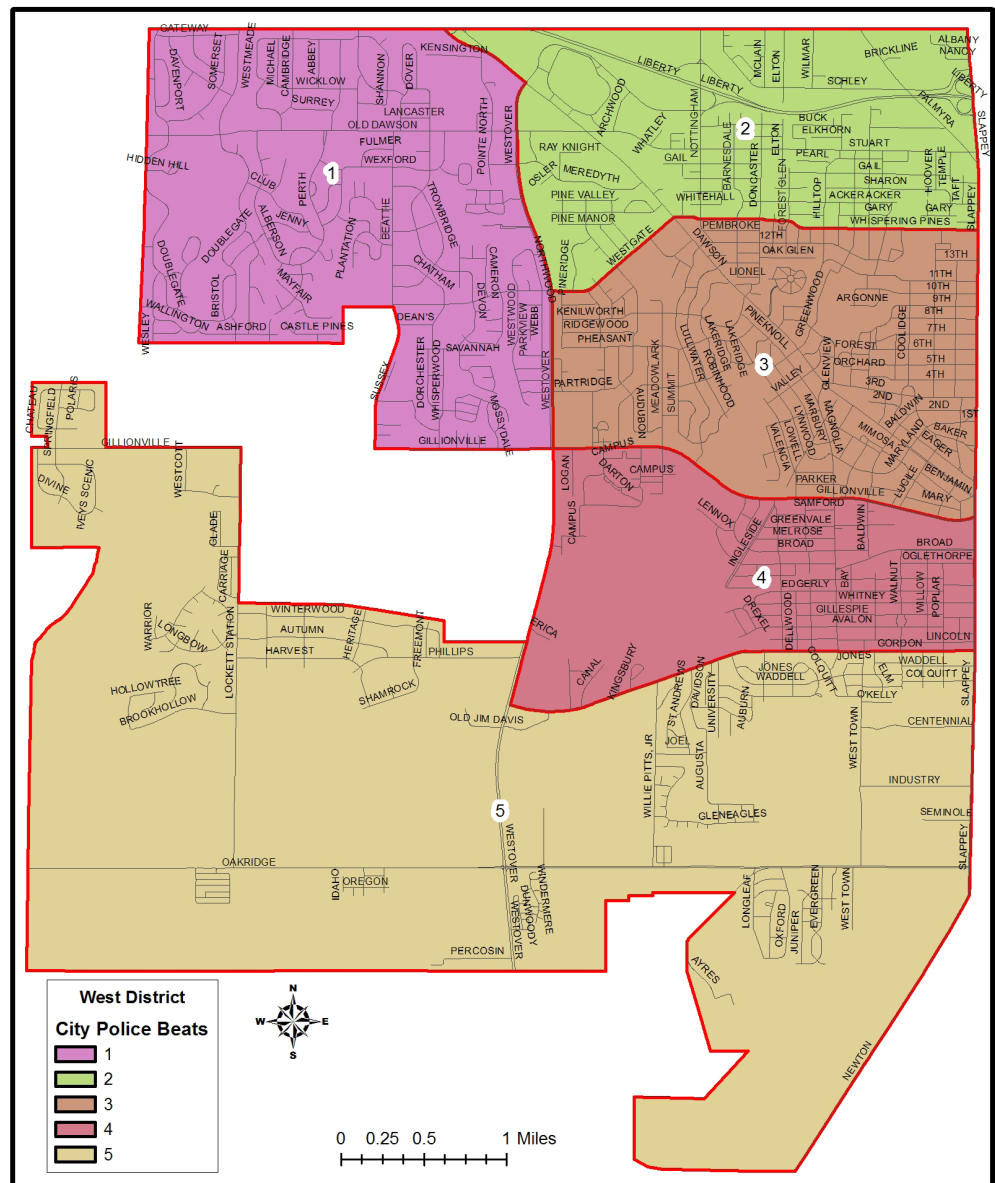
BRIEF HISTORY AND DEMOGRAPHICS

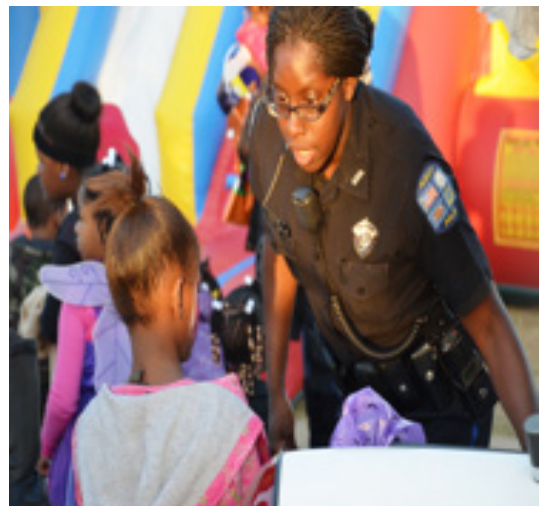

During these operations we participated in a Prostitution Sting, Probationer Checks and the Halloween Round-up of Sexual Offenders.

Addressing the ever changing crime trend within the West District with the shopliftings in and around the Mall area and the increasing thefts which often occur and rise in number during the summer months have been challenging. We contribute much of our success in placing suspects in jail and solving crimes to the citizens of Albany, especially those living in the West District. During the summer months we participated and spear headed Operation 734, where a collaborative effort between the Albany Police Department and other city and county agencies targeted trouble areas over a 7 day period. This was the first time that 21 separate operations were undertaken within a one week time frame. Many arrests were made and the information obtained invaluable.

CENTRAL DISTRICT

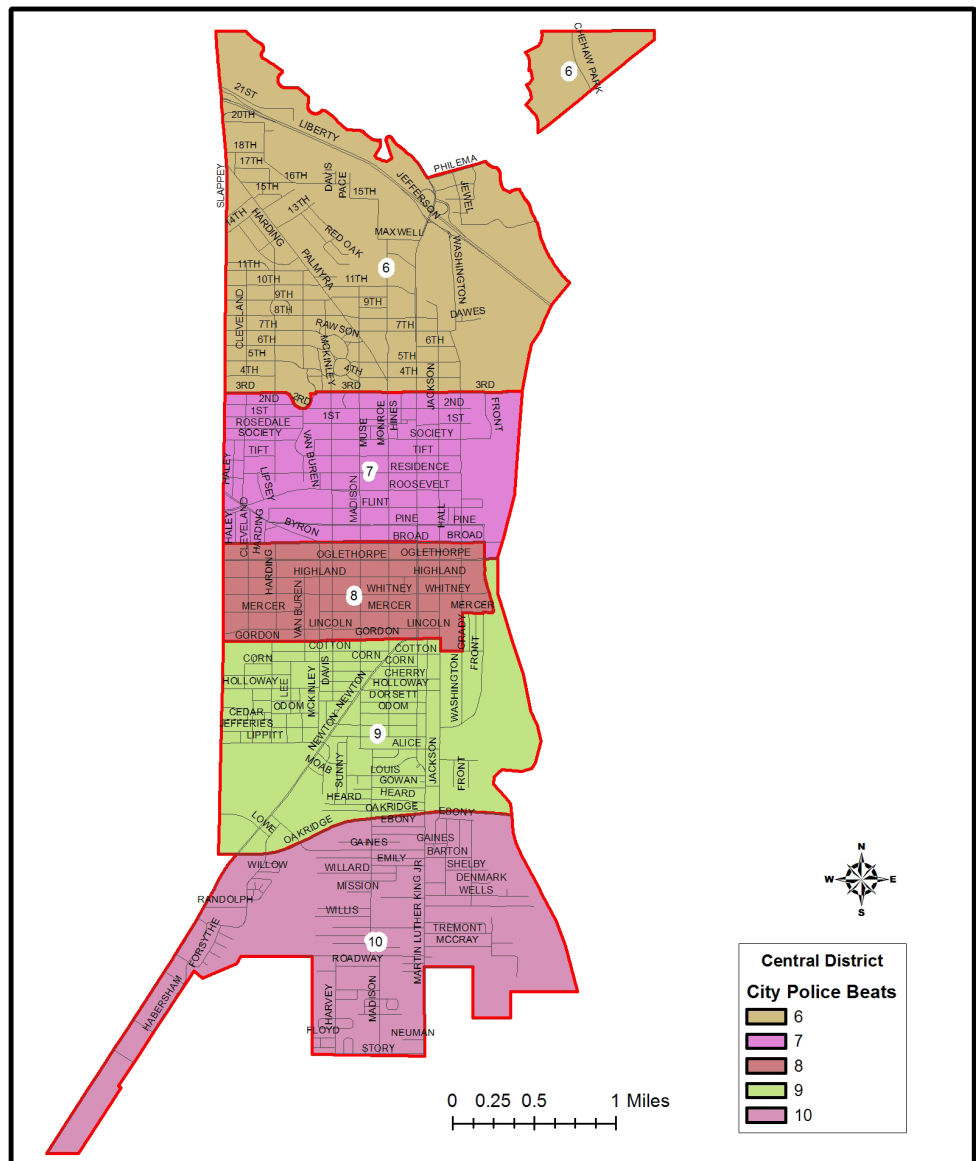

If you like a challenge and like to be in the know; then the Central District is the place to be. Over the past 21 years I've had the pleasure of working in various capacities throughout this Department; none have given me the biggest obstacles to overcome or the greatest sense of reward as serving as the District Commander for the Central District. Providing oversight for a demographic that is largely comprised of what would be deemed some of the most challenging criminal elements that has stricken the City of Albany, keeps me in tune with innovative policing concepts as well as Community Policing techniques to assist in my ability to lead while strategically preventing crime.

BRIEF HISTORY

The Central District is the most diverse and densely populated section of the city. It is comprised of residential both housing complexes and standard neighborhoods; big business corporations and smaller Mom & Pop type businesses. Most of City and County governmental buildings are located in the Central such as the Court-house & Sheriff's Office, Tag and Tax office, City Manager's Office, Mayor's Office, and Federal courthouse. It is also the recreational hub of not only for the citizens of Albany but for surrounding counties as well with the Civic Center, Turtle Park, Tift Park (City Parks & Recreation Headquarters), Thronateeska Heritage & Wetherbee Planetarium, Flint River Aquarian, Albany Theater, Albany Municipal Auditorium, the Downtown area, Chamber of Commerce, The Parks of Chehaw, and several night clubs, restaurants, hotels. With the huge influx of people into and around the Central District our crime trend varies a lot depending on the time of year, number of events, and time of day activities are planned.

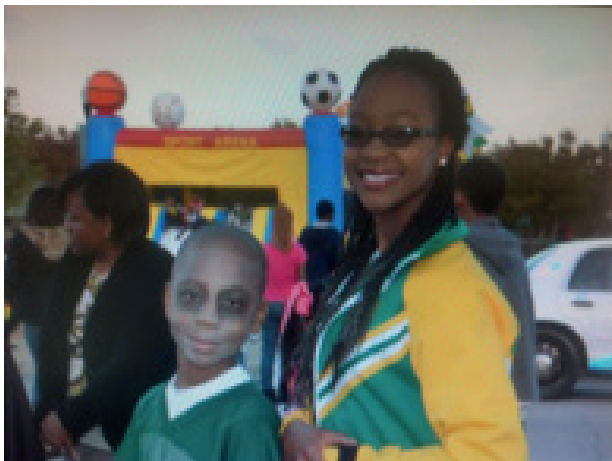
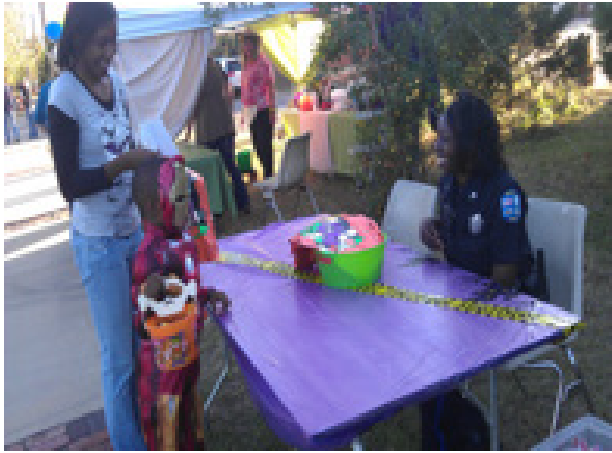

I was appointed as the Interim Captain for the East District in September 2011. My major goals were to build a strong sense of teamwork amongst officers in addition to addressing the crime trends utilizing available resources. Over the course of the year we have conducted several operations with other agencies such as but not limited to: Gang Task Force, Criminal Investigations Bureau, Albany/Dougherty Drug Unit and State of Georgia Probation. In conjunction with building partnerships and initiating unified special operations we also began developing crime data maps using our department Crime Analyst, sharing that information with officers to strengthen our crime prevention methods.

BRIEF HISTORY & DISTRICT DEMOGRAPHICS

The East District of the Albany Police Department is comprised of City Commission Wards 1, 2 and 6. The district is broken into five police beats (11, 12, 13, 14 and 15). The area is approximately 17 square miles and has a population of 23,442 citizens. The boundaries are the Flint River to the west, Pinson Road and Pine Bluff Road to the east, Lake Chehaw to the north and variable city limits to the south.

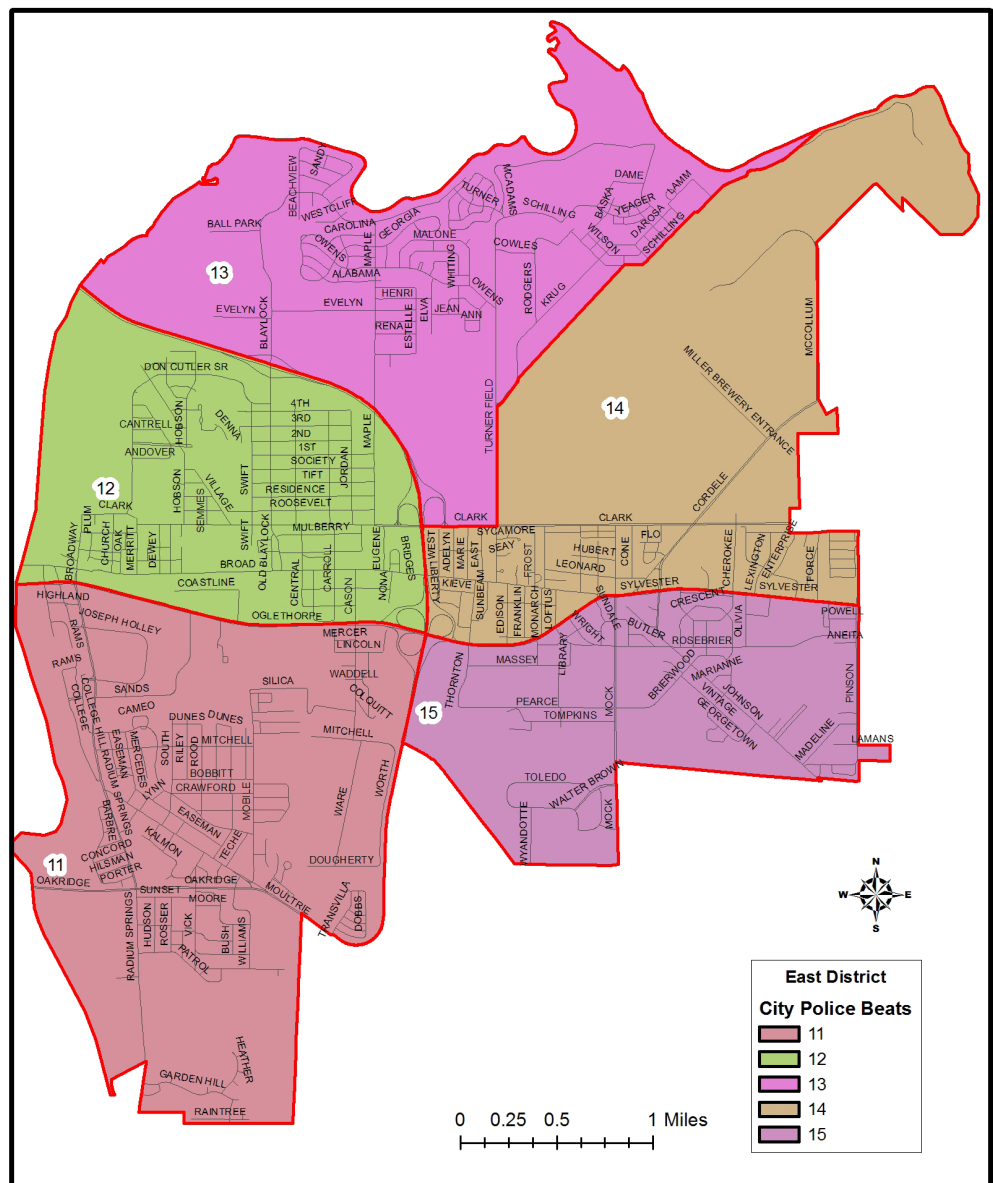

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During the year we team with other districts and agencies including the Dougherty County Sheriff's Office, Dougherty County Police Department, the Albany Dougherty Drug Unit, Dougherty County Juvenile Court Probations and Dougherty County Probations Office. During these operations we participated in a Prostitution Sting, Probationer Checks and the Halloween Round-up of Sexual Offenders.

Addressing the ever changing crime trend that we faced in East Albany, we met the challenges with innovating and creative policing tactics. Tackling the shopliftings that were occurring at Wal-Mart when off-duty officers were not present, we tactically deployed a marked cruiser in the front of the building to give the appearance of an officer at the scene. This produced a positive result and we saw the daytime incidents diminish. During the summer months we participated on Operation 734, where a collaborative effort between the Albany Police Department and other city and county agencies targeted trouble areas over a 7 day period.

During the early fall months, we experienced an increased in business burglaries along East Oglethorpe Boulevard and Sylvester Road. We began a stakeout detail using both police vehicles and undercover vehicles from the Albany Dougherty Drug Unit. During the

year, the officers of the East District have partnered with numerous agencies and civic groups taking part in an effort to improve our community. These groups include Girl Scouts of America, Limb Support Group, Fun Villa Day Care, United Way, and Acteens. In March we helped Easter Seals and raised over \$10,000.00.

The Investigative Bureau consists of four separate sections (i.e. Crimes Against Persons and Property, Forensics and Family Protection Unit, having both similar and distinctly different law enforcement responsibilities.

We are fortunate to work in a city where residents, businesses and various organizations take an active part in finding solutions to community problems. If we are to make a real difference in addressing some of the serious issues we face (i.e. aggravated assaults, robberies, rapes, homicides, burglaries, arsons, larcenies and motor vehicle thefts) it will be through our shared efforts and partnerships that our most significant and long lasting resolutions will come. This annual report is not just about the Investigative Bureau of the Police Department; it is about the Police Department, allied agencies, and members of the community working together to make a difference.

As law enforcement we are not immune to the economical situation, we are committed to the continued professional and efficient service to our citizens. We have a clear direction from the community and city leaders to remain focused on (a) criminal street activities, prevention, intervention and suppression efforts and (b) the reduction of violent crimes in the City of Albany through shared education, community engagement, expertise/training, intelligence and deployment of resources.

- Conduct prompt and diligent investigations that exceed prosecutorial standards, thus ensuring that we are providing the best services possible to our citizens.
- Maximize the use of all available technological re-

sources and traditional investigative methods to solve crime, track down and apprehend suspects, accomplices and fugitives, as well as locate missing persons and recover stolen property.

- Develop a cross-functional team of investigators that produce quality investigations on all crimes; to accomplish this, investigators will assist each other and take active roles in cases outside the scope of their primary assignment.

It is through the aforementioned efforts and positive interaction with the community that the Investigative Bureau is able to successfully eradicate criminal activities, provide quality law enforcement services, utilize covert operations, execute warrants and continue to build trust and mutual respect within our City.

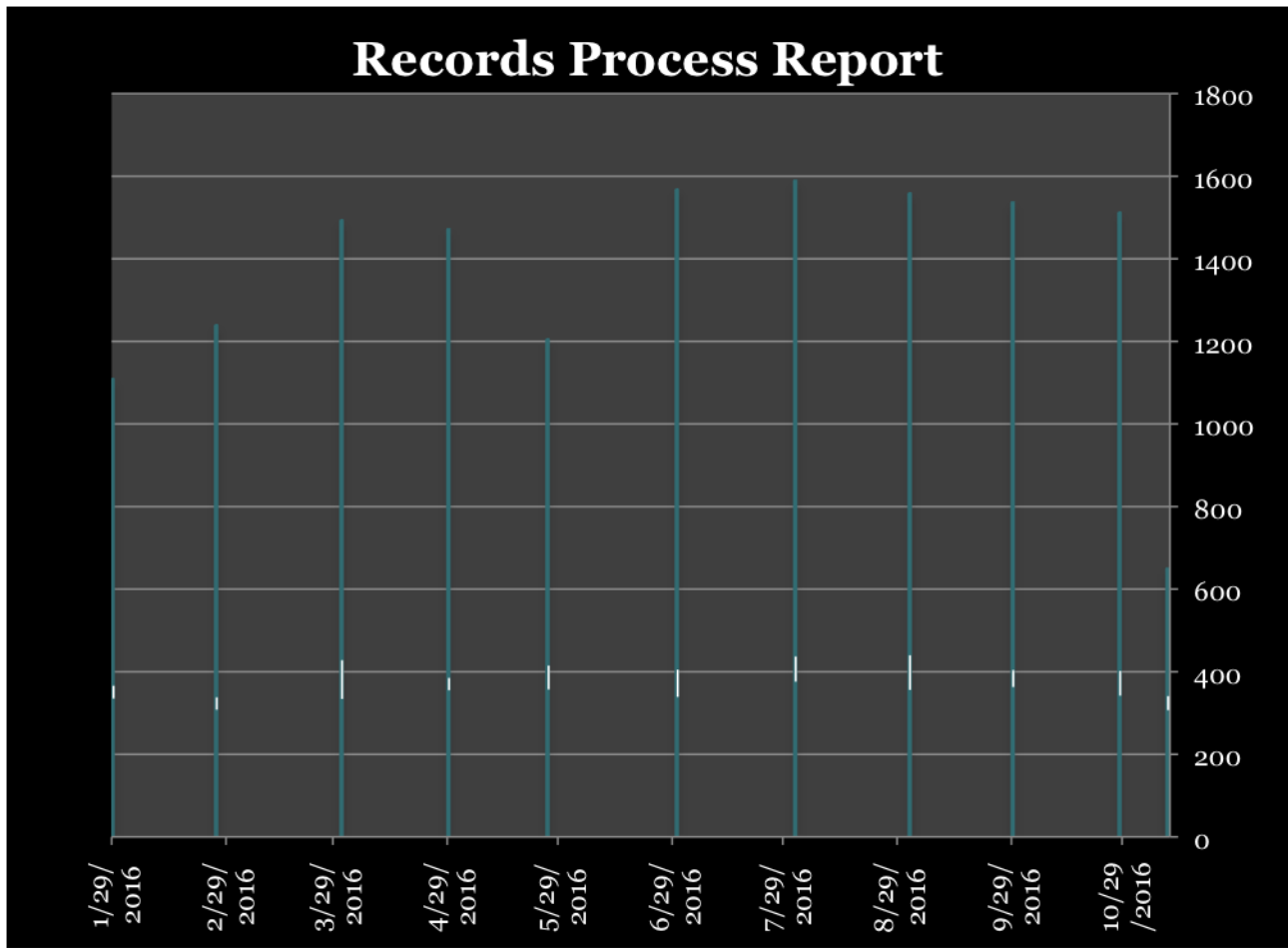
TELEPHONE INCIDENT REPORT SYSTEM (TIRS)

The TIRS/Records section received approximately 155,247 calls for service during this year. There were approximately seven hundred (700) Incident reports were entered into the Crimes system by the TIRS officers in the Records section. The number of supplemental reports produced is not included because the system is not equipped to calculate these numbers.

The Officers in the TIRS section are responsible for a number of tasks required besides writing reports. Their duties include filing reports, citations, and tickets, they handle all law enforcement related phone calls and inquiries made at the service window and they monitor the department's Georgia Criminal Information Center / National Criminal Information Center data base. This involves both the input and output of data in the system.
